

# 2024 Queensland Disaster Management Research Forum update

The <u>2024 Queensland Disaster Management Research Forum</u> took place on 19 November at Rydges Southbank. This year, we welcomed over 300 participants, both in-person and online, making it our largest turnout to date.

The Honourable Mr Dan Purdie MP, Minister for Police and Emergency Services, opened the Forum by highlighting the valuable role research plays in the Queensland Disaster Management Arrangements (QDMA).

Focusing on embedding research into practice, Dr Alastair Stark and Eleanor Williams started the day by challenging the audience to think about learning and how organisations approach knowledge.

Attendees enjoyed a series of presentations that illustrated how research has shaped practice in areas such as heat waves, biological

hazards, climate change, and community engagement, as well as updates from the Queensland Disaster Research Alliance and Natural Hazards Research Australia.



The Forum also featured emerging Queensland researchers exploring a range of topics, including the use of artificial intelligence for predicting fire spread, community-level resilience indices, waste management, earthquake-resistant building designs, and the roles of legal professionals during disasters.

## **Queensland Disaster Research Alliance**

The Queensland Disaster Research Alliance (QDRA) continues to lead the way in advancing disaster resilience and management through innovative research and collaboration.

This year, QDRA has made significant strides in enhancing partnerships and supporting high-impact projects that directly benefit Queensland communities.

One key achievement in 2024 is the creation of the Queensland Disaster Researchers Database, a comprehensive resource that maps the expertise and capabilities of disaster researchers across Queensland. This database is developed through an annual survey that incorporates national and state priority documents, ensuring that it reflects the most relevant research areas and challenges.

By promoting collaboration among academic institutions, government, and industry, the database helps address pressing disaster management issues and facilitates more effective responses to emerging challenges.

QDRA continues to support several important research projects:

- A Disaster Ready Fund (<u>DRF</u>) project addressing heat-health risks in Queensland, led by Dr. Shannon Rutherford from <u>Griffith University</u> and involving James Cook University (<u>JCU</u>).
- A NHRA project titled "Quantitative Review of the Ecosystem Resilience Program to Inform a Long-Term Monitoring Strategy," led by Dr. Ali Chauvenet from Griffith University.
- Collaborations with Queensland Fire Department (QFD) including Pine Fire Behaviour Models, High Biomass Grasses and Grassland Fuel Curing and Condition, led by Dr. Sanjeev Srivastava from the <u>University of Sunshine Coast</u>.

## Natural Hazards Research Australia



<u>Natural Hazard Research Australia</u> (the Centre) is delighted to be part of Research Connect and looks forward to sharing research innovation and utilisation in the coming editions.

Queensland is at the forefront of research-to-practice integration in a collaboration between the University of Queensland, the Queensland Reconstruction Authority and the Centre. Led by the Academy of Management's 2024 Joanne Martin Trailblazer award winner <a href="Prof Paula Jarzawkowski">Prof Paula Jarzawkowski</a>, <a href="Evaluating the Resilient Homes Fund">Evaluating the Resilient Homes Fund</a> is driving collaborative program and policy evaluation in disaster resilience by assessing the Resilient Homes Fund's Resilient Retrofit, Home Raising and Voluntary Home Buy-Back options.

Lived experience of natural hazards including <u>Tropical Cyclones Yasi in 2011 and Kirrily in 2024</u> and the Townsville floods in 2019, gave the winning 2024 Disaster Challenge team the idea and motivation to tackle this year's wicked problem.

The concept of an Al chat bot delivering postcode-specific disaster information developed by psychology postgraduate students at <a href="mailto:lamber-10">James Cook University</a> won the main prize, with other finalist pitches including <a href="mailto:home insurance risk reduction options">home insurance risk reduction options</a> and a <a href="mailto:multi-platform engagement">multi-platform engagement</a> to combat heatwaves.

There is a strong desire among Council's disaster managers to engage in research, participate in studies, share lessons learned, and implement recommendations. This collaborative approach ensures that the latest research informs practical disaster

management strategies, enhancing the resilience of communities.

Numerous informative projects are currently underway, presenting a wealth of opportunities for practitioners to collaborate closely with local governments. Researchers are encouraged to reach out to Councils to explore potential partnerships, while Councils are invited to submit ideas to researchers and universities to identify available opportunities.

# **Neighbourhood Centres Queensland**

Neighbourhood Centres Queensland (NCQ) recently undertook a project to strengthen the Neighbourhood Centres sector, their local communities and broader disaster management sector towards flood recovery and resilience through increased and strengthened community-led practices.

In just five months (April to August), this peer-led initiative achieved notable results, drawing on the insights of participating Neighbourhood Centres. Achievements included:

- · peer-learning sessions discussing community-led disaster practices
- · online interactions with leading disaster recovery experts
- · a mental health and wellbeing workshop for Centre staff conducted by Dr. Rob Gordon
- · development of multiple resources, including four case studies on community-led recovery efforts.

Additionally, NCQ, <u>Community Plus</u>, and <u>Benarrawa Community Development Association</u> presented their approaches at the 2024 Australia and New Zealand Disaster and Emergency Management Conference.

All resources are now available to <u>Neighbourhood Centres</u> across Queensland, with joint funding from the Queensland and Australian Governments under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (<u>DRFA</u>).

# Dr Richard Franklin - Professor, James Cook University 2024 Queensland Resilient Australia Award

Congratulates to Dr Richard Franklin for winning the <u>2024 Resilient Australia National Award</u> for Research Impact.

Richard's project addressed the critical knowledge gap regarding heatwave impacts on health service delivery across Queensland, particularly beyond Brisbane. The research identified significant increases in ambulance calls, emergency department visits, hospital admissions, and deaths during heatwaves, with vulnerable populations such as the elderly and socioeconomically disadvantaged groups being notably affected.

Collaborative efforts with state departments and academic institutions enriched the project's outcomes, leading to the integration of findings into policy and planning, including the <u>Queensland Health Heatwave Sub-Plan</u> and the <u>Stakeholder Toolkit</u>.

### Dr Alastair Stark - Building Resilience and Managing Disasters

Dr Alastair Stark is an Associate Professor in Public Policy at <u>The University of Queensland</u> specialising in the study of crisis and disaster management. Committed to bridging the gap between research and practice in the disaster management space, he is the author of three books and has published widely on the nature of democracy during crises, pre-crisis planning, crisis coordination, resilience, community participation and lesson learning.
